UPDATES FROM CONSISTORY

This past month at Consistory...

- We approved the proposed 2023 budget as presented by the Stewardship Team and our Treasurer, Debbie Perretta. We wish to thank Debbie for all the work that she put in to the budget this year. We also thank the ministry teams that helped provide information. And we thank our community that was so generous over the past year.
- We decided upon Google Drive as the cloud based database for storing our important documents.
- We acknowledged the need to support the Design Team in their work to craft goals for our congregation.
- We received team reports from each ministry teams and coordinated items as needed.
- We spoke about doing something special for Janith Mason, our Office Manager, as she ends her time of employment at Lynnwood.

Appeal for Audio Improvements

Dear Friends,

As most of you know, roughly three years ago your church responded to the challenges of the COVID pandemic separation with a rudimentary livestream for worship services. As the pandemic persisted we invested in live streaming technology for the long term, recognizing that there were other reasons to offer a regular livestream to help people stay connected in worship who otherwise would not be able. The efforts and investments have paid off and are considered successful.

At the start, we focused on the audio-visual aspects of the live stream and skipped over another challenge that has been with us for much longer but less urgent, that being the <u>in-house sound system</u>. Musical instruments are now a regular part of Sunday worship with multiple microphones in various locations which have not been properly integrated. For better than 15 years, we have made small purchases of speakers, feedback reduction devices, mixers, microphones, etc. to help us move forward but inherent acoustical problems of the sanctuary require a comprehensive solution.

We have identified newer technology through consulting that we believe will address the problems of echo, feedback, and "dead spots" of the sanctuary. A sound amplification system under consideration was demonstrated to a small group of LRC members on January 24. The system shown, plus peripheral devices needed, sound panel materials and full integration is estimated at roughly \$20K. We are fortunate to have a friend of the church who sells to us at dealer cost and provides free technical services for integration. However, there is no budget item specific for this initiative.

Learn more about Lent and Easter

What is Lent? The word Lent is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word for springtime, which literally translates in modern English to "the lengthening of the days." In the early church, the Lenten period was used as a time for preparing new converts for Baptism on Easter Sunday. Today it is a time for preparation, reflection, growth, and change. The liturgical color for Lent is purple, a solemn color, a color for royalty and repentance. The liturgical color for Easter Sunday and the Sundays between Easter and Pentecost is white, signifying purity.

When is Lent? The liturgical season of Lent begins with the solemn observance of Ash Wednesday and continues for six weeks, culminating with the church's joyous celebration of Easter.

What is Holy Week? Holy Week is the last week of Lent. During this week, Christians remember important events in the last days of Jesus's life, his death on the cross, and his resurrection from the dead.

Ash Wednesday is the official beginning of the Lenten season. It is a day of prayer and public confession of sins. In some churches the sign of the cross is made with ashes on the foreheads of believers. The early Israelites took the ashes from burnt offerings, mixed them with water, and sprinkled them over unclean persons (sinners) and their belongings (Numbers 19:17-18). In the third century, the church began the custom of burning the branches used on Palm Sunday; saving the ashes and marking sinners, such as robbers and murderers with these ashes. Out of sympathy, family and friends of these 'marked' persons began using the ashes also. This year we celebrated Ash Wednesday February 22.

Palm or Passion Sunday is a day of change from the joyful celebration of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem to the solemn knowledge of what lies ahead for him in the coming week. The custom of waving olive twigs in the procession began in the fourth century. It was not until about 400 years later that palm branches were first used, and they continue to be used today. **This year Palm Sunday is celebrated on April 2**.

Maundy Thursday This day commemorates Jesus's last supper with his disciples. During that meal in the upper room, Jesus washed his disciples' feet and gave them a new commandment: "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (John 13:34). The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin *mandatum*, meaning "command."

In commemoration of the Last Supper, Christians often partake in a simple meal of bread and wine—commonly known as the Lord's Supper or Communion—during Maundy Thursday worship services. This year we will be celebrating this communion service April 6 at Altamont Reformed Church.

What is the meaning of the Last Supper? "Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' And he did the same with the cup after supper, saying, 'This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood.'" –Luke 22:19–20

In the words that accompany the breaking of the bread and the pouring of the cup, Jesus makes it clear that his sacrifice and death is for our redemption. As he invited his disciples to partake in the Last Supper, he invites us also to a meal of faith shared among believers. By eating and drinking the Lord's Supper together, we are reminded that Jesus wants us to love each other and to forgive each other. This is the command represented in the word "Maundy."

Through Jesus's charge to "do this in remembrance of me," the Last Supper became the inaugural Lord's Supper. In this meal, also known as Communion, Reformed theology holds to the belief that the bread and wine are not changed into the actual body and blood of Christ. Rather, these elements are a reminder and promise of God's love for us.

The simple meal is also a symbolic teaching that Jesus's crucified body and shed blood spiritually feed us. Through the working of the Holy Spirit, as we share this meal, we share in the death and resurrection of Christ. This means that we accept with a believing heart that his body was offered for us and his blood was shed for us, granting us forgiveness and new life.

As we remember the depth of Jesus's suffering for us, the meal takes on a sadness and somberness. Yet, we remember that Jesus rose from the dead and he will come again. Thus, this is a meal to be celebrated and laced with joy.

Good Friday was probably first called God's Friday. On this day we remember Christ's suffering and death on the cross. **This year Good Friday is April 7**.

Easter is celebration of Christ's resurrection from the dead. and the seven weeks following is the oldest, celebrated liturgical season of the church year. The season of Easter ends with the Day of Pentecost, fifty days after Easter. This year Easter is celebrated April 9.



Lynnwood Reformed Church Director of Faith Formation Position Description

Position Vision and Overview

The Director of Faith Formation supports the ministry of Lynnwood Reformed Church through leadership and facilitation of faith formation. *The Director of Faith Formation gives focused attention to faith formation at Lynnwood by chairing the Faith Formation Team and leading them to carry out their mission and vision for people of all ages, with specific attention to youth.*

The Director of Faith Formation is a part time, approximately 20 hours per week position (some of which are on the weekend) and is supervised and supported by Lynnwood's Minister of Word and Sacrament and consistory representative to the Faith Formation Team. Compensation for this position is \$20-\$25/hr, based on experience. If you are interested please email resume and cover letter to personnel@lynnwoodreformed.org.

Job Responsibilities:

Faith Formation Team

- Chairs the team
- Prepares for meetings by creating an agenda and making sure minutes are accurately taken and sent to the Office Manager to be put in the Consistory packet

LRC Youth

- Maps out schedule for the ministry year and summer
- Communicates with parents about events, forms, etc.
- Plans and leads youth groups
- Plans and leads youth retreat
- Coordinates any meals made at youth group
- Forms relationships with parents and youth that foster belonging
- Inquires if youth would like to participate in the process of Profession of Faith

Community Youth Group

- Connects with the Altamont Reformed Church youth representative (currently Pastor Matthew) to coordinate Youth Group times, schedule, and ideas.
- Is responsible for planning and leading the Community Youth Group.

Safe Sanctuary Team

- Collects forms yearly from parents
- Helps with yearly training

Sunday School

- Organizes Sunday School yearly schedule and curriculum for Explorations (K-5th grade) and Discipleship (6th-12th grade)
- Coordinates teachers and substitutes
- Coordinates Christmas Pageant and Celebration Sunday
- Assists in leading Profession of Faith Class

Small Groups Ministry

• Works in cohort with the Faith Formation Team and Pastor to coordinate a small group ministry for the church community.

Worship

• Helps lead parts of the liturgy as gifts and ability allow; especially with youth and children.

Social Media

• Works with the Pastor and Office Manager to maintain the church's social media accounts.

Description

Lynnwood Reformed Church is seeking a qualified candidate to coordinate multiple office functions in support of pastoral work, church committees and teams, congregants, and outside groups involved in the life of the church. The Office Manager has knowledge of and is familiar with how churches conduct business and perform services of worship. They have direct contact with members, leaders,

other staff, and daily contact with the pastor to whom they report directly. They demonstrate professional conduct, sensitivity and discretion in communications and interactions as they reflect heavily on the reputation and public image of the church.

Major Responsibilities

Performs multiple communications tasks including primary responsibility for creation of monthly newsletters, Sunday bulletins, visual media for worship, social media postings, website postings, printed reports.

- Works with staff and church member volunteers from Teams/Committees within the church for special reports, updates, publishing the Annual Church Directory, maintaining certain financial records including receiving invoices and reimbursement requests, review for accuracy and forward to offsite bookkeeping service.
- Maintains the church calendar.
- Manages the use of the property and interior space (facility) for various groups, member events and community events.
- Oversees the filing system and records management to ensure both accessibility and security backups to electronic files and records.
- Administrative Assistant for the pastor. Also, assist church staff and church leadership members as needed.
- Provides coordination and reminders to all people participating in worship, with printed readings, announcements, etc.
- Office functions receives calls and mail and routes correspondence to intended parties. Orders church supplies for office, custodian, and committees/teams needing church-purchased goods and services.

Requisite Skills

- General knowledge of Christian faith and church administration
- Excellent organizational skills
- Excellent communication skills (spoken and written), can write clearly with good grammar and spelling. Excellent phone etiquette.
- Computer proficiency needed, MS Word, MS Publisher, and Microsoft Office/Excel tools essential. Knowledge of Breeze and MediaShout software is a plus.
- Social media skills with Facebook and Instagram.
- Knowledgeable with office copier, phones, basic networking
- High School graduate with two years of either college or business school training
- Five years secretarial or managerial experience is desirable.
